Architecture and Modification Committee

What is the Architectural and Modification Committee, also known as AMC?

1. It is a committee established in the Declaration of Covenants Conditions and Restrictions of JBCC (Article XI) for the purpose of reviewing, approving or denying requests from homeowners for exterior modifications to homes and landscaping
2. The committee consists of at least 5 and no more than 9 people
3. The committee has exclusive jurisdiction over modifications, additions or alterations made on or to existing units or structures
4. The committee meets every other Tuesday @ 2pm at the club house library. Meetings are open to the community to attend

How does the approval process of the AMC work?

1. Complete the AMC form. Submit the form and required attachments to the Property Manager. Be sure to initialize, sign and date the form

2. Turn your form into the office no later than noon on Thursday before the following Tuesday meeting. Meeting dates can be found on the Community Calendar
3. The committee has 45 days to accept, reject or request additional information to process your application
4. Some requests may require an onsite visit by AMC to make a well-informed decision either approving or denying a request
5. If the AMC fails to approve or disapprove a request or fails to request additional information reasonably required within 45 days after submission the plans shall be deemed approved
6. Approved AMC requests are valid for 6 months. Applications in which modifications were approved but have not been performed within 6 months of approval are viewed as expired and must be resubmitted for an extension or reconsideration of approval

Committee Members are Debbie Benoit, Dave Edson, Kathy Koury, Tina Regan, and Rick Glaser.

They attend meetings every 2 weeks all year long, either in person or via zoom. They perform on site visits if needed and complete onsite visit forms. These committee members play a vital part in maintaining the beauty and aesthetics of JBCC and JV! Thank you all!

April 2025 to February 2026 there were 191 approved applications and 5 denials

Our fantastic HOA Manager Margaret Arthur goes above and beyond for the AMC and JBCC/JV homeowners keeping us on track while giving assistance and guidance. Thank you, Margaret, for your dedication to the AMC committee and community!

Buildings and Grounds Committee (B&G)

I'd like to begin this article by naming the members of the B&G committee: Lori Bennett, Terry Bennett (C), Lindy Cerer, Michele Kuehmichel, Ken Wipfler and Pete Zsiga along with Margaret Arthur, Property Manager, and Jeff Huesing, Board President/B&G Liaison.

The corner of NW Mossy Oak Way and NW Pin Oak Drive is sporting a new look thanks to efforts put forth by B&G members, Lindy Cerer and Lori Bennett. They developed a plan that began with a review of the landscape that was more than 20 years old. What they found was overgrown Philodendron and invasive ferns that were out of control. Lindy designed a new landscape, presented it to the committee and together with Lori and M&M, executed the plan. The new landscape has improved irrigation, retains some of the old plants and includes new, low maintenance plants that are very appealing (see below). The team also plans to add landscape lighting. Thanks, Lindy and Lori, for a job well done.



B&G Members at Work

- Michele Kuehmichel continued her efforts to improve the plantings around the JV rear gates. New Fakahatchee grass was planted along the exit lane in the common area that was recently cleaned by M&M. Michele is also monitoring new plants in and around the gates that were affected by the recent frost to make sure that they survive. The committee will replace plants keeping in mind the requirements of the original JV landscape plan.
- I repaired three chaise lounges at the Golden Oak pool.

Sal Mattia recently resigned from B&G so the team would like to thank him for all his efforts while a member of the committee. Sal spent many, many hours volunteering including, but not limited to, the following: He single-handedly repaired all the fencing in Jensen Village replacing rusted tension bars and clamps. He was an active member of the B&G team responsible for putting windshield tags on more than 1,000 vehicles. Sal "adopted" JV as his JBCC "spot" maintaining constant vigilance over all plantings, buildings and grounds; he regularly reported his findings. He frequently trimmed shrubbery to keep our community looking tidy. Thanks again, Sal.

Security

During 1Q26, B&G responded to 21 security-related incidents, nine of which involved our gates. Of those nine incidents, three involved contractors, five residents and one non-resident. The good news is that at the time of this article, it's been nearly two months since a resident's vehicle hit a bar arm. Remember to follow the ONE VEHICLE AT A TIME RULE to avoid hitting a bar arm.

Ken Wipfler and I promptly responded to all gate incidents taking steps to restore the bar arms and gates to normal operation. Margaret Arthur, Property Manager, pursued reimbursement of all expenses. The committee saved the HOA about \$3,000 in vendors' fees and many days of having our gates out of service by promptly responding to these incidents.

Finance

The Finance committee met in February primarily to review the HOA's 2025 financial results. During the meeting it was confirmed that all certificates of deposits (CDs) have expired and were not renewed; today we are invested mostly in U.S.

Treasury bills. It was also determined that any deposits held by utility companies have been returned. Lastly, Margaret Arthur, Property Manager, confirmed that both the annual audit and biennial reserve study are close to completion.

 - 2026 Budgeted Amt. - \$293.9K

The committee is continuing its analysis of HOA expenses. Keith Corlett assumed responsibility for doing a deep dive into the water usage at the JV pool and the JV US1 fountain while Ken Wipfler is monitoring expenses associated with irrigation repairs.

Judy Caffiero and I are developing financial forecasting that compares budgeted amounts versus expenditures to identify potential areas of concern and help manage expectations throughout the year. The analysis will report on all expenses, especially those that are paid at varied times throughout the year (vs. monthly). This reporting will replace a lot of manual time and effort.

Your Finance committee members are Debbie Arthur, Terry Bennett, Judy Caffiero, Keith Corlett, Barbara Iraci, Bill Levant, Ken Wipfler, Pete Zsiga and Jim Menendez, Board Treasurer/Finance Committee Liaison.

Neighbor Spotlight: Around the World with Pollie and Jeffers

While many of us spent the last few winters enjoying the Florida sunshine, our neighbors **Pollie and Jeffers** were busy navigating the globe. Since uniting as a couple in 2021, this dynamic duo has turned the horizon into their second home. Together, they have completed two massive world cruises (2023 and 2025) aboard the *Island Princess* & *Holland America Zuiderdam* respectively, spending over eight months at sea exploring the most fabled destinations on Earth.

A Match Made in Travel Heaven

Pollie and Jeffers' story didn't start at sea; it began years ago as neighbors and friends at the same church on Long Island. Both had traveled extensively with their first spouses—collectively visiting every continent except Antarctica. When they reunited and joined lives in 2021, they realized their shared wanderlust was the perfect foundation for their new chapter.

"Given our advanced years," Pollie shares, "we decided seeing the world via a world cruise would be the perfect fit." To keep things simple, they choose voyages that depart and return right here in South Florida to avoid the stress of long-haul flights.

Two Voyages, One World: The Highlights



Across their two journeys, they covered nearly **70,000 nautical miles**. While Jeffers—a former British Airforce veteran and investment banker—was "laser-focused" on seeing animals in their natural habitats, Pollie—a retired NYC educator—found her "blissful elation" in the world's great gardens.

A Journey Guided by Faith

For Pollie and Jeffers, travel is as much a spiritual experience as it is a physical one. Pollie begins every adventure with a prayer for protection and guidance, and each voyage ends with a return prayer of gratitude. Their 2025 log begins with a moving request: *"Allow us to see you in unfamiliar places and faces to experience your love in everyone we meet."* Their faith led them to the world's most sacred spaces, from **La Sagrada Familia** in Barcelona (which they named the most beautiful church in the world) to the **Megalithic Temples of Malta**, which pre-date the Pyramids.

Aha! Moments: From 24-Tuk-Tuk Caravans to "Nature on Steroids"

For Pollie and Jeffers, the world isn't just a map; it's a series of "aha!" moments, some more adrenaline-pumping than others. Take their 2023 visit to **Colombo, Sri Lanka**, for instance. While most people might opt for a quiet bus tour, this duo found themselves in a high-speed caravan of **24 tuk-tuks**.



Sri Lanka Tuk Tuk Adventure!

Pollie recalls the thrill of skilled drivers darting in and out of traffic with "near misses" that would make a stunt driver sweat, making her feel like a kid again. When they weren't

dodging traffic, they were finding peace in **Singapore**, a city Pollie describes as "nature on steroids." Even a grueling wait in the customs line couldn't dampen her "blissful elation" at seeing the **Gardens by the Bay**. Between the 360-degree views from the 57th floor of the **Marina Bay Sands** and the iconic Orchid Garden, it was a horticultural dream come true.



Of course, not every "aha!" moment happened on land. Jeffers, ever the nature lover, was mesmerized by the sight of **thousands of seals in Namibia** and the ancient ruins of **Ephesus, Turkey**. Then there was **Easter Island**, where the massive monuments exceeded every expectation, and the historic megaliths of **Malta**. Even a quiet prayer at the **Wailing Wall in Israel** turned into a charming "aha!" moment when Jeffers accidentally tried to enter the ladies' side. Luckily, a fellow shipmate was there to lend him a hat and point him toward the men's entrance, ensuring his prayers were rendered right on schedule!

Tastes of the World: Underground Ovens and Lagoon Lounging

If you want to talk about "sumptuous" dining, Pollie and Jeffers have the ultimate resume. One of their most unique culinary adventures took place on **Oholei Beach in Tonga**. Despite Pollie's initial hesitation about venturing into a cave, she was rewarded with a meal cooked entirely

underground by a local family. Between the native songs, dances, and the food unearthed right before their eyes, it was an "over the top" experience. Not to be outdone, **French Polynesia** offered what they call the "frosting on the cake." During a **Tahaa Motu picnic**, the pair didn't just eat near the water—they ate in it. With their table positioned in the shimmering turquoise lagoon and their feet submerged in the sea, they feasted on *poisson cru*, grilled fish, and a fresh tropical salad.

The couple also has a soft spot for European flair, recalling a "crate-ly" wonderful lunch in **Sardinia, Italy**. At a local



winery, under perfect skies, they were served a unique meal presented in a wooden crate—a rustic touch they still rave about. No world journey is complete without a little danger, and for Jeffers, seeing animals in their natural habitat is a top priority. This led them to the legendary **Komodo Island**. While the thought of a ten-foot lizard might send some running back to the buffet on the *Zuiderdam*, Pollie and Jeffers embraced the "extraordinary educational journey" of seeing these prehistoric giants up close. They also attended a purification ceremony and marveled at the sheer resilience of the wildlife (and the tourists!). It was a stark contrast to the gentle Blue Iguanas they visited in the Caymans or the thousands of seals in Namibia, proving that whether it's a "Palmarium" with a thousand species of palms in Spain or a giant lizard in Indonesia, Pollie and Jeffers are always ready for the next adventure.

Pro-Traveler Tips from the Pair

- 1) **The Preparation:** Book at least one year in advance. Forward your mail to a PO Box, as the post office won't hold it for four months!
- 2) **The Logbook:** Pollie researches every port before leaving and completes her journal while at sea so it is finished the moment they arrive home.
- 3) **Health & Safety:** Bring a cane for uneven terrain and book a cabin in the **middle-lower portion** of the ship to minimize seasickness.
- 4) **Small Souvenirs:** They stick to magnets and patches for Pollie's jacket to save space in their home.

The Best Part of the Journey: Coming Home

Despite the "blissful elation" of seeing the world, Pollie and Jeffers are always happy to return to Red Maple Drive in **Jensen Beach Country Club**. They look forward to getting back to local church services, sleeping late, and finally eating on their own schedule.

But don't expect them to stay put for long—Pollie is already researching ports for their **129-day "Circle Pacific" world cruise in 2027!**

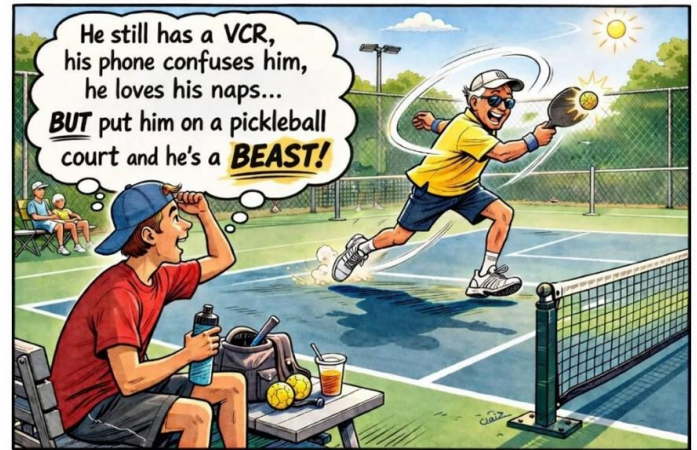

Master Gardener Pruning Croton

Most crotons suffered damage from the severe cold spell this past winter and will need pruning back to maintain a bushy appearance.



Cutting back a croton to where you want the bushing to start will help develop a more lush and thicker foliated plant. Croton pruning can be done most anytime here in Florida except when we are having a cold snap. The most ideal time is early spring before new growth appears.

Wearing gloves and using clean pruners, cut about a foot above where you want the plant to flush out. Never cut back more than one third of the plant. Make your cuts just above a leaf bud and at a slight angle. Keep the plant watered and fed.

Keeping your crotons from becoming too tall and leggy can be done by pinching off the new growth to encourage them to fill out.
