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The sign at the entrance to our community on Jensen Beach Blvd. is in the works and is expected to be completed in the next few weeks.

We were able to resolve our issues with D.R. Horton and Champion Pool and are waiting receive the settlement checks:

DR Horton: \$25,000,00

Champion Pool: \$55,000.00

And recently, overdue HOA fees were collected from two homeowners, totaling \$20,426.11.

As of this writing we have received 542 votes on the Amendments. Just a reminder that April 30th is the deadline for you to vote.

We have received quotes for the two gates for the entrance on Jensen Beach Blvd and on the Fennel Rd. entrance to Jensen Village. We are in the process of getting them installed.

Some months three meetings are held depending on where the first Tuesday of the month falls. Applications must be submitted no later than noon on the Thursday before the next Tuesday meeting.

### I'm submitting an application for landscape upgrades and tree removal. I can't find my survey to annotate with these changes. How do I obtain a current survey of my property?

- Navigate to the Martin County Building Department [www.martin.fl.us/building](http://www.martin.fl.us/building). On the website, click on **Request Building Records, Blueprints** then, click on **Request for Building Permit Copies Form**. Complete the form and email it to the email address shown at the top of the form. A representative from the Building Department will respond to your email. There is no charge if you use email and you will often receive your survey in one business day.
- You can also contact the Building Department by telephone at 772-288-5916. The representative will take your information and provide your survey in a few days.

## Buildings and Grounds Committee (B&G)

Before we get into B&G, a friendly reminder to DRIVE 25! Please keep our self-policed roads as safe as possible by driving 25 mph (or less). And remember the rule when approaching a JBCC bar arm: ONE VEHICLE AT A TIME. It takes only a few seconds to let the bar arm safely descend before proceeding. If you wrongly assume that your bar code sticker was read by the scanner, it may cost you thousands of dollars in repairs to gate equipment.

Tom Bednarek has been monitoring the landscape and planters at the Pin Oak pool. He took steps to have an overgrown imperial bromeliad transplanted and replaced some small, unsightly palms. New plants will be put in the planters and the team will begin to design a new landscape for the front of the clubhouse. The team will continue its practice of consulting with subject matter experts toward the new landscape design.

Michelle Kuehmichel rolled up her sleeves and spent time trimming several trees and shrubs at the Golden Oak pool. She also helped remove some dead boxwoods.

JBCC maintenance man, Larry Craddock and I revisited the need for street signs after his initial attempt to replace a couple of badly weathered street signs. What we found is that the mounting hardware was basically fused in place making it impossible to be reused. We have since ordered new hardware that will be used to mount several new street signs throughout the community.

B&G is continuing its efforts to improve lighting at several common areas by turning its attention to the Golden Oak pool. The pool is extremely dark at night so the team will plan to install new landscape lighting and repair broken fixtures.



## What Happened?



A recent visit to the center island at the end of NW Oak Branch Ct. revealed what Winston Churchill may have described as “a riddle wrapped in a mystery inside an enigma.” For quite some time, the entire area has been completely devoid of all plant life except for a drought tolerant gumbo-limbo tree. But that wasn’t always the case as can be seen in this dated online screenshot (MS Bing).

So, what the heck happened? (Readers: If you have any insight into this landscaping, please contact me directly.) B&G has been inquiring with local landscape experts and intends to have soil tests done. The committee wants to improve the landscape, but not without knowing why two large palm trees and other mature plantings met their demise. Maybe all plantings were removed because they were dying or perhaps a new landscape plan was being considered but never came to fruition.

Once we get to the bottom of this matter, the committee will proceed to discuss landscaping improvements. Stay tuned as we unravel this mystery or riddle, ummm, whatever.

Lastly, Lori Bennett spearheaded an effort to have two “Welcome Home” signs created and installed – one at the Jensen Beach Blvd. entrance and the other at the US1 entrance. These signs will serve as a reminder of how wonderful it is to live in our beautiful community.

## Finance Committee

First of all, the JBCC HOA is financially healthy.

The finance committee has reviewed the in-house year-end financials prepared by the management company and the January and February 2024 monthly financials.

These monthly financials are a comparison to the budget for the year and are mainly cash basis or a modified accrual basis (cash basis with some prepaid and accrual items). They are NOT the same as the audited year-end financial statements that are full accrual basis. So, there will be



differences when we receive the accountant's statements. To the date of this writing, the audited statements have not been received.

The 2023 numbers reflect that we came in under budget by over \$50,000.00. This means that either we overestimated some expenses when we prepared the 2023 budget or some moneys were just not spent.

The amount of \$50,000.00 is rolled over to the 2024 budget in order to reduce what we pay for our HOA fees in 2024. In other words, it is being credited back to our accounts.

When the audited statements are received, the \$50,000 net income will disappear, because these were funds that were revenues in prior years, not in 2023. So, without any other accounting adjustments, we were close to break even in 2023, give or take a few thousand. On a budget that was over \$3.5 million, this is great news!

## Master Gardener



### Whisk-Fern (*Psilotum nudum* – Sigh-LOW-tum NUDE-um)

This primitive looking native plant often mistaken as a weed can be found in moist areas in the landscape, garden pots or as an epiphyte in trees and palms. Lime green to yellowish green in color the whisk fern has no roots,

leaves, seeds or fruit. New plants develop from spores found in ball-like out growths extending from the stem. Instead of roots, the whisk fern has rhizomes which hold onto the soil. Growing about one-foot tall, its Y-shaped stems contain chlorophyll and do photosynthesize. Whisk fern can be found in tropical areas around the world. Whether you grow them on purpose or fight them as a weed, consider taking a moment to appreciate these odd ball plants.

Meet animal lover, Connie Heidbuechel. Connie is from Germany and has lived and worked in the States for 27 years; living in JBCC since 2003. Connie is busy running her own business and devotes some "spare" time serving on the Board of Directors of the local no-kill animal sanctuary, [Dogs & Cats Forever, Inc.](#) Connie is an avid lover of all animals, including smaller pets, horses, pigs, cows, racoons...you name it and she will do whatever it takes to help an animal in distress. Connie has fostered pets and has helped to find them permanent homes. Her fostering goes above and beyond what some pet owners might be willing to do. While serving on the Board of Directors of another animal welfare organization years ago, someone found three kittens in the woods. Connie took them home and bottle-fed them every three hours – what a



Mom! Fortunately, after nine weeks, she found them all loving homes. Connie's innate love for animals was further nurtured by the leading woman behind Dogs & Cats Forever, Inc., Jay Apicella, who has literally devoted her life to the cause. Like Connie, Amy Hayden also serves on the Board of a local No Kill Rescue ([the Farm Dog Rescue](#)), where she adopted her dog, Eddi, a.k.a., Eddi Spaghetti – no he's not an Italian breed. "He quickly became Eddi Spaghetti!" "Anyone who knows him now call him Spaghetti, it just fits his personality." He is very quirky and has disabilities, but he too deserves to be loved. He has been a blessing to Amy's home where his funny behaviors provide needed comic relief. Amy loves how Eddi Spaghetti brings a smile to the face of everyone he meets. Amy has had Eddi for almost six years and can't imagine life without him. Eddi is from Farm Dog Rescue where dogs and cats are never in a shelter, they are all placed into a foster home until they are adopted. They also pull dogs from Kill Shelters that are going to be killed and try to get them placed into a foster home. Amy and her late husband came across Eddi at a shelter in St. Lucie County - Eddi was going to be killed that week. Before taking Eddi, Amy went back to meet him and took her other dog Baxter. The two dogs got along fine, so she decided to foster him. After fostering Eddi for a few weeks, a family wanted to adopt him. After two nights, the family called and decided he was too difficult for them to take care of. He was returned to Amy to continue to foster. Soon after, Amy and her husband decided Eddi had a tough enough life and felt he deserved a loving family – theirs. And who doesn't love Spaghetti?

Jeri Spinella and her family have enjoyed the love of a pet for the past 50 years. Sometimes it is only after we have lost a loved one that our pets demonstrate their restorative love and devotion to us. Except for two dogs, all of Jerri's dogs, have been female terriers. In 2012, Jeri and her husband Joseph had to say goodbye to their Gabby. That is when the amazing Tally unexpectedly entered their lives on a trip to Pet Smart. A local pet shelter had set up a display with a variety of cats, dogs, and puppies. Jeri noticed a lone puppy chewing on a pig's ear (the dehydrated type). Jeri petted the adorable pup and asked the shelter rep if she could give the puppy a walk around the store. Although Jeri and Joseph had both made the decision not to have another dog, they could not leave without Tally. Five years later Jeri's husband passed away. Jeri was true to the promise she made him to keep Tally (though all their children asked for her.)

Jeri has had "dogs with papers" and loved them all, but learned that dogs of mixed breeds are usually healthier and do not typically present the health issues of their parents. Jeri's adult children have rescued a total of 10 dogs. They have never returned one to the shelter. As Jeri stated, "You just need preparation and patience for a short time." Please, Adopt, Don't Shop!



